Why do we remember Mary Seacole and Edith Cavell?

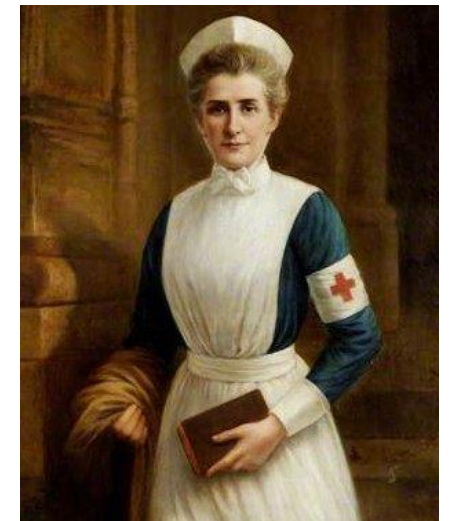
Key Vocabulary	Definition
 Crimean War	(1853-1856) A war between Russia on one side and Britain, France and Turkey on the other side.
 World War I	(1914-1918) First World War or World War I. A global war with many countries involved.
 battlefield	A place where soldiers fight in war.
 racism	When someone is treated differently because of their race, ethnicity, nationality or colour.

hospital	A building where doctors and nurses take care of people who are ill or injured.
nurse	Somebody who takes care of people who are sick or injured.
patients	People who are being looked after by nurses and doctors.
soldier	A person who is trained to fight in wars.

- Edith helped over 200 soldiers escape from the German army.
